Located in the Blayney Shire Library, Adelaide Street, Blayney the Viv Kable Collection displays rural and domestic tools and implements from yesteryear. Many documents and items associated with the development of Blayney are also on display. A unique feature of the collection is the catalogue compiled by Mr Viv Kable which can be accessed through the History Resource database at the Library.

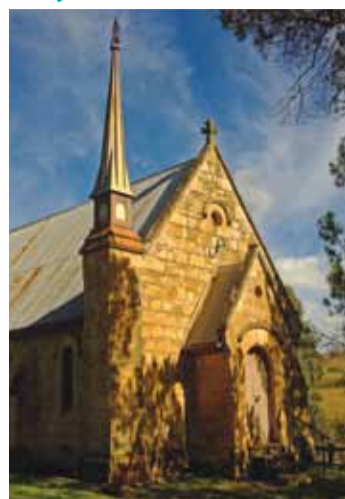

The Museum located in Pye Street has a fascinating collection of local history items with the main themes of display being military, bushrangers, Aboriginal heritage and town and district history.



Eugowra is well known as the scene of the biggest gold escort robbery at Escort Rock, when bushrangers Frank Gardiner, Ben Hall, John Gilbert and their gang held up the coach carrying £14,000 worth of gold and cash from the Forbes gold fields on its way to the bank in Orange. Eugowra has many places of interest, visit the Fat Lamb Hotel or take a trip to the Lavender Farm.

Byng



Settled in the 1830s by Cornish Methodist families, it was known as the Cornish Settlement and then as Carangara. In 1854 the village reserve was approved by Governor Fitzroy and became known as the Parish of Byng, Bathurst County. Byng was named after Admiral John Byng who was executed for treason in 1757.

The Wesleyan Chapel, which is located on the site of the original church of 1842, is still in use today. Opposite is the historic cemetery with graves of pioneers of the district.

Cadia

Mining and mineral exploration has been a feature of the history and landscape at Cadia since the 1860s, alongside grazing and agriculture. The old Cadia Village is now part of the Newcrest Cadia Valley Operations.

Lucknow

The Lucknow heritage walking trail and interpretative signage provides an image of the gold rush and local history of the town. Lucknow is the site of the Wentworth Goldfields, relics such as the Wentworth and Reform poppet heads still remain. Discover the Miner's Walk along Frederick's Valley Creek adjacent to the Wentworth Main Mine. Orange City Council is currently developing the Wentworth Main Mine Site as a tourism and educational facility.



Canowindra

The Museum located in Gaskill Street depicts the development of Canowindra from the 1840s as a frontier village on the Belubula River to its growth as an important rural centre. A pre-1901 Pioneers Wall and Citizens Pathway lead into the museum from heritage listed Gaskill Street and interpretative signs tell Canowindra's railway story. Outbuildings display horse drawn vehicles, vintage farm machinery, specially featuring lucerne, Canowindra's 'green gold', a woolshed, a schoolroom and an authentic slab hut.

The main buildings house a complete dental surgery, displays of wedding gowns, household memorabilia, bushranger exploits, photos of floods, pioneer families and Canowindra's early streetscape: a nostalgic experience for all.

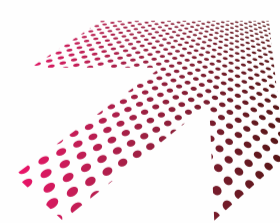

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Carcoar

Stoke Stable

Open Thursday to Monday 10am-5pm, Admission by donation
Built by convict labour c. 1849 in Naylor Street—and possibly the oldest building in Carcoar—"Stoke Stable" is the home of the Carcoar Historical Society Museum. The Museum displays historical photos and memorabilia reflecting the residential, industrial and agricultural history of the local area.

Carcoar Hospital Museum

The original building located in Eulamore street is one of the earliest colonial hospital buildings in Australia and built to the design of architect Edward Gell. The museum has a male ward with small adjoining private ward, drawing room, surgeon's operating room, lobbies and verandah.

Carmanhurst Room

Located in the School of Arts, Icely Street, in what used to be the projectionist's room, a collection of war memorabilia is on display. This collection is managed by the Lyndhurst Branch of the RSL.

The Court House

Situated in Icely Street, built in 1882 and designed by the Government architect James Barnet, the Carcoar Courthouse replaced one designed by Edmund Blackett. The current courthouse ceased operation in the 1950s and became the headquarters of the local historical society in 1994.

Manildra

Situated 20km south west of Molong on the banks of the Mandagery Creek, Manildra is a small village and home to the largest flour mill in the southern hemisphere.



The Amusu Theatre is one of Australia's oldest operating picture theatres. It was established in 1923 as a travelling picture show. The theatre still offers visitors and community members the opportunity to view new release films.

Take a step back in time and explore the rich social, mining and agricultural history of the district. The museum situated in Park Street has a Wiradjuri display, interactive schoolroom, a collection of tractors and a 13 tonne Clayton Shuttleworth steam traction engine. The Museum of Rural Technology tracks the development of machinery and its local use for pea picking, potato cropping and farming in the district. Most of the machinery has been made operational for the museum environment.



Visitors can also enjoy local craft and produce from the Jacoba Craft Cottage.

Molong

Situated 32kms north west from Orange, the main street of Molong is classified by the National Trust. Molong has many beautiful historic buildings scattered throughout the town.

The Molong Historical Museum

Located at 20 Riddell Street, the museum building was constructed in 1856 as the Golden Fleece Hotel. The museum displays an extensive collection of local history and heritage items. Discover the story of child migration and Molong's

Fairbridge Farm—from 1938 to the 1970s many British children found a new home and new education opportunities in Molong.

Yuranigh's Grave

5km east of Molong on the Mitchell Highway is Yuranigh's Grave; Yuranigh was an Aboriginal guide to Thomas Mitchell. Described by Mitchell as "guide, companion and friend", Yuranigh accompanied him on his expedition to Queensland in 1845. When Mitchell heard of his death, he paid for the headstone on his grave. Yuranigh was buried according to aboriginal custom with carved trees at each corner of his grave, which indicated he was a man of special honour.

Ophir

Orange Visitor Information Centre 1800 069 466

Set amongst rugged hills and streams the Ophir Recreation Reserve includes the site of the original village of Ophir as well as the Ophir Goldfield where Australia's first payable gold was found in 1851. Walking trails, the historic cemetery, camping areas, gold panning and fossicking invite exploration of this scenic and historic site. The reserve is open daily.



Orange

There are many places of historic interest in Orange. The City's heritage walks & drives provide a sample of the City's renowned Federation and Victorian architecture. The many parks and gardens, in particular Cook Park and the Orange Botanic Gardens, provide a stunning display of ever changing colour. Visit Banjo Paterson Park, the site of Banjo's birthplace or Chinamen's Bend Cemetery a pioneer Cemetery originating in the 1820s.



Orange has a long history of producing a wide range of seasonal produce, discover the many cellar doors and restaurants in Orange and the surrounding district.

Mt Canobolas

Mt Canobolas is the highest peak westwards until Africa, rising to 1395m above seal level. On a clear day the summit is visible from 150km away. Mt Canobolas State Conservation Area hosts many picnic areas and walking tracks. On your way to Mt Canobolas is Lake Canobolas, offering picnic and BBQ facilities, a walking trail and children's playground.



Yeoval

75km from Orange, the village of Yeoval sits on the cross roads of Molong, Dubbo and Wellington. Banjo Paterson spent his first seven years of childhood in the village. If you're driving from Cumnock to Yeoval keep your eyes out for the bikes in the trees, part of the Mulga Bill Festival held in Yeoval each year. The festival celebrates Banjo Paterson's childhood in Yeoval with a bike ride from Cumnock to Yeoval.
