Since its foundation in 1975, Wagga Wagga Art Gallery has worked to promote a rich and vibrant regional culture, by providing a visual arts environment that inspires and informs the communities of the Riverina. The Gallery offers opportunities for a diverse and innovative range of creative expression, while maintaining the cultural heritage of the Gallery's nationally significant collections.

Each year, Wagga Wagga Art Gallery welcomes over 40,000 visitors of all ages to experience a wide variety of exhibitions, programs and special events. We proudly present the work of Riverina artists as well as the best visiting exhibitions from Australia and overseas.

The Gallery is the home of the National Art Glass Collection, a world-renowned and nationally significant collection of contemporary art glass featuring over five hundred pieces displayed in a stand alone gallery, the National Art Glass Gallery. We're also the home of Margaret Carnegie Print Collection, with over fourteen hundred original prints by many of Australia's foremost artists.

Wagga Wagga Art Gallery is a cultural facility of Wagga Wagga City Council, and is supported by the NSW Government through Arts NSW.

The Museum of the Riverina provides a regular program of travelling exhibitions with a diversity of themes throughout the year. It's one of two museum sites in Wagga Wagga, the other being at the Botanic Gardens Heritage site three kilometres from the city. Both are operated by the City Council.

This site was originally built in 1881 as the City's Town Hall and Municipal Offices Council Chambers, as well as the seat of Local Government until 1999 when it was converted into the Museum of the Riverina. It has a wonderful wooden arch ceiling and a dignified atmosphere.

Museum of the Riverina Botanic Garden site

The Botanic Garden site is one of two museum locations in Wagga Wagga supported by the City Council. The other is in the historic 1881 Town Hall building.

Three kilometres from the city centre, the exhibits at the Botanic Garden site highlights the people, places and events that give Wagga Wagga its unique character, and is home of the museum's permanent collection.

The collection is diverse and contains many objects of local origin with national significance–this includes the migration stories of Germans as they moved from South Australia into the Riverina in the mid 19th century.

The museum has a kimino collection from Mitsue Stockley, long term resident of Wagga Wagga, and the Pauline Harvey Collection which consists of eisteddfod certificates, programs, photographs, eisteddfod trophies, dancing costumes, accessories and props, all dating to circa 1940s.

The Wagga Wagga Sporting Hall of Fame is on display here.

In addition to the Heritage Centre, pictured, the RAAF Base Wagga has a display of static aircraft at the front gate which can be viewed at any time.

Currently a Canberra bomber, Meteor jet, Mirage and Sabre fighters and a Winjeel trainer may be seen on display.

Wagga Wagga RAAF Museum was officially opened in June 1995 with a collection of object from the RAAF Base Wagga and icommunity donations.
