Cape Byron Lighthouse Maritime Museum

Located within the Cape Byron Lighthouse in the one-time head lightkeepers office, the Cape Byron Lighthouse Maritime Museum offers visitors insight into the days before fully-automated lighthouses and the long tradition of lightkeepers.

The Museum also displays images and artefacts from the days when Byron Bay was a venue for whale hunting rather than whale watching. A team of dedicated volunteers staff the museum 7 days a week and are happy to answer questions.

Guided tours to the top of the lighthouse are available depending on visitor numbers.

Lismore Regional Gallery

Mullumbimby Museum

As you enter the the main Museum you realise that the building was Mullumbimby's first Post Office and contains many reminders from when it was built in 1907.

The Brunswick Valley Historical Society seeks to collect and conserve objects, images and documents that record the social, economic and civic history of the Brunswick Valley. We publish material relevant to the area, interpret and display the collection to engage and educate the community in their local history as well as provide research facilities.

Our Museum was relocated to its present site in 1984. Summers park in which the Museum and external exhibits are located has a replica slab cottage, a collection of horse drawn farm implements, and equipment from the local railway, hydro power facility and brick works.

Tweed Regional Museum

Established in 2004 the Tweed Regional Museum has three locations; Murwillumbah, Tweed Heads and Uki. Spanning the Shire from the coast to the mountains, the branches of Tweed Regional Museum are a unique journey into the history, people and places of the majestic Tweed Valley.

The Murwillumbah branch is located in the original Shire Council Chambers of 1915 and has recently opened after major redevelopment. The award winning multi-million dollar upgrade treasures the old and embraces the new. The historic 1915 building has been restored to its former glory and now flows into a spacious and modern exhibition area, with vibrant displays bringing Tweed's history to life through stories of our past.

During 2017 the Tweed Heads branch underwent major refurbishment. The original Tweed Heads Court House, constructed in 1926 and moved to the current site in 1985, is now the centerpiece. The story of this heritage building and of law and order in the Tweed, together with highlights from the Museum's extensive photographic collection, are featured.

The smallest branch of the museum is in the picturesque village of Uki, nestled at the base of Wollumbin / Mt Warning. This branch is a local heritage resource centre housing a small collection of historic objects and photographs about life over the years in the remote upper reaches of the valley.

Tweed Regional Gallery & Margaret Olley Art Centre

If you haven't visited the stunning Tweed Art Gallery before, you'll be amazed by the large, modern facility displaying first-rate exhibitions.

Surrounded by beautiful gardens and lawns and offering panoramic views of the Tweed River, the Gallery was established on this site in 2004, and was extended in 2006. The prestigious Margaret Olley Art Centre was completed in May 2014 and is already a renowned tourist destination.

The Gallery offers six exhibition spaces, a workshop and education area, a Gallery Café with indoor/outdoor seating, a Gallery Shop and research library. The Gallery has disabled facilities, including a lift and set down area, undercover parking and a bus parking area.

You'll enjoy a program of vibrant exhibitions, which change approximately every eight weeks. The exhibition spaces host a vibrant program of historical and contemporary touring exhibitions of national significance, alongside curated exhibitions of established national and regional artists.

Our program includes the \$20,000 Olive Cotton Award for photographic portraiture. The Gallery's collection includes a world class collection of portraits representing Australians from all walks of life.

You might like to participate in the Gallery's exciting variety of programs including public events, concerts, exhibition openings, artists' talks, demonstrations and workshops which cater for all ages.

Minjungbal Aboriginal Cultural Centre


Aboriginal Community facility

The Minjungbal Aboriginal Cultural Centre at South Tweed Heads is located within the Tweed Heads historic site, which adjoins the Ukerebagh Nature Reserve. Their aim is to preserve and protect the significant cultural heritage of the area and to provide a facility for all people to explore and enjoy the beauty of the native coastal bushland environment.

Learn from the detailed exhibits and videos in the centre's museum, how the Aboriginals lived in what was virtually a paradise. Explore the natural surroundings and see an authentic bora ring - a sacred ceremonial site.

Have a picnic or barbecue lunch and relax in the tranquil and beautiful bush setting. Cooking facilities and light refreshments are available.
