MESSAGE FROM MICHAEL ROLFE CEO M&G NSW

2012 saw the continuation of many long term, popular and well subscribed Museums & Galleries NSW programs and services. It also saw work commence on the creation of a of a new 'game changing' digital strategy for the organisation. Our 2012-14 Strategic Plan identified the need to better service our constituents and their programs using a web presence that reflects museum and gallery best practice. And that is what we set about doing, with a decision made by the board in October to proceed with the creation of a new mobile friendly website, scheduled for launch in the 2nd half of 2013. GALLERY PROGRAMS AND TOURING **EXHIBITIONS**

M&G NSW continues to tour exhibitions of contemporary visual art, craft and design to communities across Australia. In 2012, 9 exhibitions toured to 32 venues across 5 states and were seen by over 108,000 people. They showcased the works of 114 living artists and included over 200 works of art and objects across various mediums. Touring exhibitions provided valuable audience development opportunities for host galleries, leading to the execution of 287 associated public program events and the distribution of educational resources produced or supported by M&G NSW to 240 schools.

ARCHIBALD PRIZE 2011 and 2012

The Art Gallery of NSW (AGNSW) Archibald Prize is one of Australia's oldest and most prestigious art awards. Since its inception in 1921 the prize has been awarded to some of Australia's most important artists and continues to attract record audiences. This popularity results in the exhibition tour being booked out years in advance.

LIFE IN YOUR HANDS: ART FROM SOLASTALGIA

Curated by Robyn Daw and organised by Lake Macquarie City Art Gallery, Life in Your Hands features the work of 9 contemporary artists and craft/design practitioners that explore the notion of 'solastalgia' - the impact of environmental stresses, loss of connection to past, and economic and political change on the mental wellbeing of communities.

SURVIVOR: DADANG CHRISTANTO Survivor: Dadang Christanto is a major art project by contemporary Indonesian-Australian artist Dadang Christanto, initially developed in 2008 as a live protest against an environmental disaster in Java, Indonesia. Curated by Gallery 4A Centre for Contemporary Asian Art, Survivor consists of a participatory performance and subsequent exhibition that reflects upon human survival and

what it means to endure tragic historical

events, loss and death

HOW YESTERDAY REMEMBERS TOMORROW

Curated by Artspace, the exhibition draws upon previous recipients of the prestigious Helen Lempriere Travelling Art Scholarship who are now accomplished artists and key figures pushing the boundaries of contemporary art. How Yesterday Remembers Tomorrow highlights how an artist's practice develops over time through research. experimentation and refinement by positioning early works alongside more recent projects.

SENSE OF PLACE

Sense of Place features the work of eight Australian artists united by their exploration of the boundaries of national identity. cultural propriety and social paradigms. all through the medium of moving image. Organised by dLux MediaArts, Sense of Place includes artists Kate Murphy, Justin Shoulder, Sarah Goffman, John A Douglas, Brendan Lee, Laith McGregor, Darren Sylvester and Liam Benson.

LIGHT SENSITIVE MATERIAL: WORKS FROM THE VERGHIS COLLECTION

Curated by Bathurst Regional Art Gallery, Light Sensitive Material: Works from the Verghis Collection is a vibrant selection of contemporary photographic, light and digital media works from the private collection of Rachel Verghis, one of Australia's youngest art collectors.

STUDIO: AUSTRALIAN PAINTERS PHOTOGRAPHED BY R. IAN LLOYD STUDIO: Australian Painters Photographed by R. Ian Llovd reveals a broad crosssection of painters from across Australia working in a variety of studio environments; whether it be an inner city loft, a kitchen

THERE'S A WAR ON! WORLD WAR II AT HOME (Small Scale)

table or the sandy earth of the outback.

There's a War On! World War II at Home showcases the varied experiences of the men, women and children who fought the war on the home front. The exhibition draws attention to the important role regional towns played in supporting the war effort and the permanent imprint left by World War II on many country towns.

MUSEUMS PROGRAMS AND COLLECTIONS

The Museums Standards program ran in the Eastern Riverina region in partnership with seven local councils, strengthening the museum practices and sustainability of nine local museums and engaging over 230 volunteers. The 2012 Program continued the partnership with Museums & Galleries Services Queensland (M&GSQ) working with nine museums and galleries in Wide Bay Burnett (North).

The Regional Museum Advisor Program, established in 2000, provides funds for a Museum Advisor to work with museums within a local government area for 20 days per year. Supporting 76 museums in 20 local government areas, the Museum Advisor program continued to support the work of over 400 volunteers through the provision of advice and specialist skills.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

In 2012 M&G NSW delivered professiona development events at no or low cost to almost 600 participants from across regional and metropolitan NSW. Topic areas included: video conferencing, Aboriginal Reconciliation Action Plans, use of database software, collection management, conservation, digitising collections and oral history.

GRANTS

With increased funding from the NSW Government through Arts NSW, M&G NSW managed three devolved grant programs: Incoming Touring Exhibition Grant, Mentorships and Fellowships and Volunteer Initiated Museum (VIM) Grant programs.

Over \$20,000 was devolved though fellowships and mentorships to 8 museum and gallery professionals and \$85,000 through the VIM program to support the work of over 3000 museum volunteers across 47 local government areas in NSW.

The Incoming Touring Exhibition grants devolved \$50,000 to 10 galleries across 8 regions of NSW to support the intake of touring exhibitions and associated public programs. From 2013, the grant program will be transitioning to focus on providing curatorial support and the creative development of new exhibition programs.

The Artist and Curator In-Residence Program (ACR), funded by the Copyright Agency Limited's (CAL) Cultural Fund, funded two regional galleries to engage artists or curators to undertake a residency activity within the gallery's community. Through this support, the program aims to further encourage audience engagement with innovative and adventurous contemporary art.

ABORIGINAL SECTOR

Delegate recommendations from the 2011 summit held on Aboriginal keeping places, knowledge centres and cultural centres, and M&G NSW's responses to these recommendations, were made public and reported to government in 2012. One of the clear recommendations from the delegates was the establishment of an Aboriginal Culture and Heritage Association. To examine the feasibility and level of interest in this recommendation a series of consultations took place with Aboriginal communities and organisations across NSW in Sydney, Penrith, Eden, Huskisson, Corindi Beach, the Hunter-Matiland region, Lismore, Moree, Walgett, Brewarrina, Warren, Dubbo, Wagga Wagga, Griffith, Leeton, Deniliquin and Albury. In light of the positive response, M&G NSW will facilitate the establishment of the association in 2013 and provide the secretariat for its initial phase.

The ability of Aboriginal communities to gather, store and disseminate their own material culture and knowledge so they own, control and benefit from their intellectual property was high on the agenda in every consultation. This aligns with the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Article 31.a and 31.b which requires Governments to do all they can to support these objectives. With support from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Data Archive (ATSIDA) at the University of Technology Sydney, State Library of NSW and Indigenous Student Services, Charles Sturt University, M&G NSW was able to stage workshops in Sydney and Wagga to introduce the Mukurtu database freeware. This collection database offers limitless possibilities for customizing Indigenous protocols around access across all media. As a result, at least four Aboriginal communities are progressing use of the 1.0 version with assistance from US based Universities Berkley and Washington State and many other communities have expressed enthusiasm for getting involved.

In 2012, M&G NSW registered its Aboriginal Reconciliation Action Plan (RAP) with Reconciliation Australia. The RAP provides quantifiable directions for our work to contribute to closing the gap of disadvantage between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people. It also identifies a sense of place for our office in Woolloomooloo through local Aboriginal connections and understanding. The actions fit within our Business and Strategic Plans and the RAP has been endorsed by the M&G NSW Board and Reconciliation Australia.

M&G NSW SEEKS TO LEAD BY EXAMPLE IN THE RECOGNITION AND RENEWAL OF ABORIGINAL CULTURE. **HERITAGE AND ARTS** IN NSW.

High profile Aboriginal academic and author Prof. Larissa Lavarch was appointed to the Board of M&G NSW, an initiative of engaging Aboriginal leadership at the highest level of the organisation that has been a guiding principle almost since its beginnings. As with the RAP plan, M&G NSW seeks to lead by example in the recognition and renewal of Aboriginal culture, heritage and arts in NSW.

2012 IMAGINE AWARDS

In partnership with the Local Government Association of NSW and Shires Association of NSW. Regional Public Galleries Association of NSW, and Museums Australia (NSW). Museums & Galleries NSW presented the 5th annual IMAGinE awards. The four categories; Collection Management, Education and Public Engagement, Education and Audience Development and Individual Achievement, received a total of 70 nominations from volunteer and paid organisations across NSW with 13 awards granted at the event in November held at White Rabbit Gallery.

RESEARCH

As part of its research program, M&G NSW undertook an audience survey for the 17th Biennale of Sydney. This built on the methodology of the 2008 and 2010 Biennales and included an in-depth survey that looked at other cultural activities and cultural expenditure of Biennale audiences.

2012 also saw the extension of the strategic audience evaluation study, Guess Who's Going to the Gallery, in partnership with Museum & Gallery Services Oueensland (M&GSO). With over 3,000 responses, the Queensland report was released in March 2013 to provide a parallel data set to the NSW State report. Both of these reports add a greater understanding of audiences for the visual arts and crafts, providing organisations with clearer directions for both programing and communication strategies.

RESOURCES

A NEW WEBSITE

In October 2012, M&G NSW successfully procured the Interaction Consortium to begin building a new website scheduled for launch in September 2013. The website will be a hub for news, advice and services for regional small to medium museums, galleries and Aboriginal cultural centres. The website's core work is to maximise the digital value of the skills and knowledge of the sector by providing a hub for news, advice and services for regional small to medium museums, galleries and Aboriginal cultural centres.

In addition, the website will promote NSW heritage and visual arts culture in the regions with a vibrant, media rich and mobile online experience. Visitors will be able to explore regional destinations and activities, discover hidden gems on cultural trails and design their own travel itineraries with a geolocational interface.

EXHIBITIONS REGISTER

Two editions of the Exhibitions Register were published on the M&G NSW website in February and August 2012 and were directly promoted to galleries and museums across the state and nationwide. The August Register included 48 Exhibitions from 36 arts organisations including galleries, museums and our National Exhibitions Touring Support (NETS) partners, as well as independent curators and artists.
