Handle textiles, furniture, ceramic and glass objects

Handling textiles

How to:

- Examine for areas of fragility
- Support evenly across the length of the item, using a tray where possible
- Do not pick up costume by the shoulders
- If carrying items on a hanger, support the length by draping over arms
- If carrying a rolled textile, carry via the areas of the roller which extend beyond the length of the textile

Handling furniture

- Do not lift via protrusions, chair arms or backs, or table tops
- Remove drawers or secure with cotton ties
- Secure doors with cotton ties or lock them
- Place keys in labelled bags and keep them in a safe place
- Remove any loose fittings such as finials or glass tops
- Lift chairs via the seat rail (placing hands under the seat)
- Lift tables from the legs

Handling metals

• Use nitrile gloves to prevent tarnishing/ corrosion from the oils in your hands

Handling ceramics and glass

- Remove lids
- Use disposable surgical gloves (commonly nitrile); cotton gloves make it hard to get a secure grip on slippery surfaces
